**SPECIES OF
MAGNOLIA**

Species	Size
Southern Magnolia (<i>Magnolia grandiflora</i>)	Mature height is 60 to 80' feet with a spread of about 30 to 50'. Medium growth rate
Saucer Magnolia (<i>Magnolia x soulangiana</i>)	Mature height of 10 to 20' with a spread of 10 to 20'. It has a moderate to slow growth rate
Star Magnolia (<i>Magnolia halleana</i> , recently, <i>M. stellata</i>)	Mature height is 10 to 15' with a spread of 7 to 10'. This is a slow growing tree

**USING
MAGNOLIA**



Magnolias can be used as individual specimens for shade or in groups for screens or borders. They make great additions to mixed garden beds and are stunning against a backdrop of tall evergreens. Smaller magnolias can also be grown in containers and trained as espaliers in warmer areas. As city trees, they are ideal for yards and park areas. Magnolia branches, buds, fruits, flowers, and twigs are all useful in indoor arrangements. Force early blooms by cutting branches and placing them in warm water with preservative. Enjoy watching the buds unfold in a light room.



**PLANTING
MAGNOLIA**



Magnolias thrive in full sun, but need protection from early morning sun to prevent frost damage. They are adaptable to a wide range of soils, as long as it has good moisture retention and drainage. When planting, choose a sheltered area and consider staking for the first year. To maintain healthy growth, keep soil pH between 5.0 to 7.0 and check ties on the staked tree to prevent abrasion on the bark.

**CARING FOR
MAGNOLIA**

To care for magnolias:

- Plant in full sun and sheltered areas, with soil that has good moisture retention and drainage.
- Mulch with organic material to protect roots and soil.
- Water regularly for the first year, then only in drought.
- Prune occasionally for damage, size and shape after flowering.
- Feed once a year in the fall, but established trees don't need it.
- Little winter pruning is needed, but remove water shoots and maintain shapeliness.

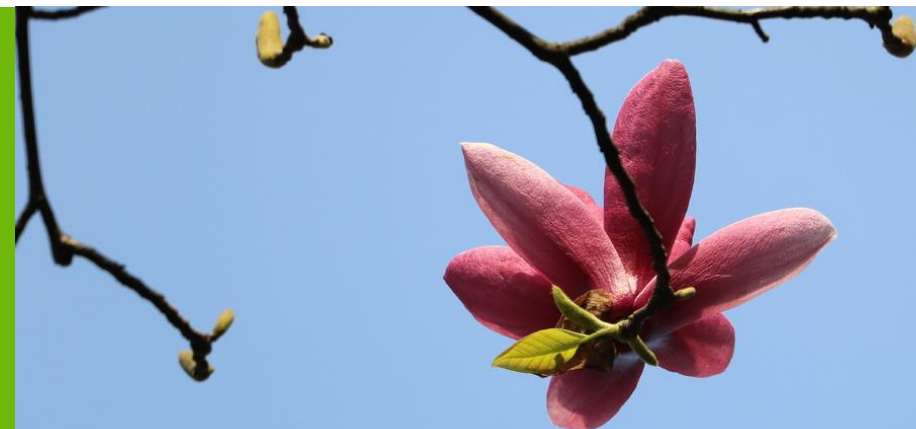

**PROBLEMS OF
MAGNOLIA**



- 🌸 Small Bumps on Leaves and Branches
- 🌸 Leaves Spotted; Drop Prematurely
- 🌸 Brown Spots on Flowers; Torn Leaves
- 🌸 Bark Cut or Bruised; Growth Stunted
- 🌸 Leaves Stippled; Covered with Webs
- 🌸 Leaves Pale; Coated with Honeydew
- 🌸 Holes in Leaves
- 🌸 Lesions on Stems/Trunk; Foliage Thins; Dieback
- 🌸 Dead Leaves Matted Together
- 🌸 Leaves Turn Brown and Collapse
